Postgraduate School

Lincoln University also co-hosts a joint postgraduate school within Food Transitions 2050, a new strategic partnership initiative between five research organisations located in the Canterbury region: AgResearch, Manaaki Whenua - Landcare Research, Plant & Food Research, Lincoln University and the University of Canterbury.

The school is a virtual community of PhD students and their university/Crown Research Institute (CRI) supervisory teams, conducting cross-disciplinary research to support the transition of our regional, national and international food systems to a future, more sustainable, state.

Doctoral Scholarships

A Lincoln University Doctoral Scholarship is one of the most prestigious in Aotearoa New Zealand.

It will help you to further expand your knowledge and potential through PhD study and research and is awarded purely on your academic ability and study achievements to date.

A number of generic and discipline specific Doctoral scholarships are offered annually.

Scholarship value is currently \$28,000 annually for a maximum of three years, paid in fortnightly installments, plus tuition fees.

PhD entry requirements

An appropriate and relevant postgraduate Honours or Master's degree awarded with at least secondclass honours, division one or equivalent (a grade average of a B+ or higher).

In addition, your previous qualification must include a significant research component, such as a project, dissertation or thesis, requiring at least 40 credit equivalents of research skills in your previous qualification.

If English is not your first language, you will need to provide evidence that you are able to meet the English language requirements for admission to Lincoln. If you don't currently have this, you can provide it to us later.

English for Academic Purposes (EAP)

Don't meet the English proficiency requirement? You can study our EAP courses on campus to prepare you for successful postgraduate study.

The programme will give you the skills you need for future study or a career, and to meet the English language entry requirements for our academic programmes. You will not be required to sit any other test, such as IELTS or TOEFL.

Tuition Fees

Domestic fee PhD - per 120 credits NZD\$8076.

You may apply for admission at any time during the year, from here or overseas, but you must commence your study in New Zealand.

International PhD students are usually eligible for domestic fees. You must be living in New Zealand to be classified as a domestic student and pay domestic tuition fees. If you don't meet the domestic tuition criteria, international tuition fees may apply.

In addition to Domestic Tuition Fees, there is also an annual Student Services Fee.

It is recommended that international students budget between NZ\$22,000 to NZ\$25,000 per year to cover medical and travel insurance, accommodation and general living expenses.

Accommodation is not covered in study fees.



Intake semesters

PhD students can start at any time during the year where there is mutual agreement with your supervisor and you are not restricted to semester starts.
