

Ann Scanlan Memorial Scholarship



Background

Ann Scanlan was a passionate high country farmer who made an immense contribution to farming and the high country community and as a role model for young women working in the farming industry.

As a young shepherd, it was at Tautane, in the North Island, under renowned dog triallist Bob Bryson, that she really developed her stock and dog skills and, from that point on, she pushed the boundaries in many ways including farm management, sheep handling and wool production.

After returning to the South Island Ann was fortunate to meet John & Heather Perriam from Bendigo Station. John and his late wife Heather had just bought Otamatapaio Station, between Otematata and Omarama, in partnership with the Botto family from Italy, and the Lempriere family from Australia.

The Italians were sceptical at the start about appointing a woman manager to their investment, however Ann was soon to prove them very wrong with her dedication to the property.

The three families went on to purchase Rugged Ridges in the Waitaki Valley and Glenrock Station in the MacKenzie to add to their group and Ann moved into the General Manager's position overseeing the three properties.

During the 2004 autumn muster at Bendigo Station, Miss Scanlan found a woolblind merino wether, with a mammoth 27kg fleece, who had evaded being shorn for six years. Shrek, as he was named, became the most famous sheep in New Zealand and attracted international media attention.

Her love and passion for sheep and wool meant that she developed, in record time, one of the best merino flocks in New Zealand and also won the Otago Merino Wools Association Clip of the Year title of which she was immensely proud of the recognition from her peers. Ann was also the former chairwoman of the Otago Merino Association, a long-standing committee member and was the 2014 recipient of the Heather Perriam Memorial Trophy for services to the merino industry.

Along with her OMA work, Ann was the junior vice-president of the Upper Clutha A&P Society. That was due to her enthusiasm for the A&P movement, the work she had done in the sheep section at the show and her ability as a leader and organiser.

Also a very keen sportswoman, with interests including dog trialling, multisport and hockey, Miss Scanlan competed in multisport events in New Zealand, including Challenge Wanaka, and internationally. She was a member of the Challenge Wanaka Sports Trust.

In 2012, she competed in the Cairns half-ironman in Australia, finishing second in her age group and then went on to compete in the world half ironman championships in Las Vegas. She was to have represented New Zealand at the ITU duathlon world championships in Canada in 2013, however sadly she was too ill to go.

Ann died in May 2014 aged 53 after a determined fight against cancer.

Regulations

1. Purpose

The Ann Scanlan Scholarship was established in 2022 to support a female student who is entering their 2nd or subsequent year of study towards a Bachelor or Postgraduate degree at Lincoln University with a focus on wool.

2. Number/Value

One scholarship will be offered annually to a full-time student studying at Lincoln University. The annual value of the scholarship shall be \$4,000 towards tuition fees.

3. Eligibility

- a. Applicants must be full time students registered in their 2nd or subsequent years of their Bachelor or Postgraduate degree with a focus on wool.
- b. Applicants must be New Zealand Citizens or Permanent Residents.

4. Selection Criteria

The criteria for selection will be

- a. Academic Merit
- b. Evidence of and/or planned activity to support the New Zealand wool industry.

5. Selection Committee

The scholarship shall be awarded based on a recommendation of a selection committee which shall comprise:

- a. The Convenor of the Scholarships Committee, or nominee
- b. A representative of the Lincoln University Agriculture and Life Sciences faculty, and
- c. A representative of the Ann Scanlan Trust.

The selection committee may request the applicant to attend an interview of no more than 20 minutes as part of the selection process.

The selection committee may refrain from making an award if it finds no candidate of sufficient merit.

6. Tenure

- a. The scholarship is tenable for one academic year.
- b. Previous recipients may apply for a continuing scholarship.
- c. The scholarship is tenable with any other scholarship, award or bursary.
